NEW: As of March 2011 the <u>Tiki Suite Proposal</u> is being implemented to re-organize the Tiki documentation into a distinct set of guides (in preparation for Tiki7):

This **Tiki Installation Guide** includes information for installing Tiki in a number of different environments.

You don't have to be a web developer or programmer to install Tiki. Tiki includes an easy-to-use, wizard-based installer (the **Tiki Installer**) which will do most of the work for you. For some items, you will need access to your webhost's control panel.



You might consider using <u>Tiki Friendly hosts</u> — webhosts that support Tiki. Many of these hosts will install Tiki for you free of charge.

Tiki is also available as a one-click installation from many popular web host applications (such as Fantastico, SimpleScripts, and Jumpbox). Consult your webhost for details.

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Requirements and Setup

This page lists the minimum requirements and recommended settings to install Tiki.

If you are using a standard <u>shared webhost</u>, your webhost most likely meets these requirements and you should be able to install Tiki with no problems. Tiki is designed to run on shared hosting, using the <u>LAMP stack</u>.

These instructions are useful for people that are configuring their own server for Tiki.

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Shared Host

Tiki will run in most shared webhost environments. Many hosts offer Tiki installation via a control panel application (such as Fantastico).

You should verify that your webhost meets the minimum requirements:

- <u>Webserver</u>
- MySQL
- <u>PHP</u>

See <u>Tiki Friendly Hosts</u> for a list of working shared host environments.



Requirements

Webserver

You must have a fully operational webserver in order to install and use Tiki. Tiki *should* run on **any** webserver that supports PHP (such as <u>Windows IIS</u> or <u>lighttpd</u>), but is most widely tested and used with <u>Apache</u>. You may need to make minor modifications for non-Apache webservers.

To simply installation on Windows IIs, Tiki is included in the Windows Web App Gallery and can be installed with the Microsoft Web Platform Installer. See <u>Microsoft Web Platform installer</u> for details.

Your webserver should be configured with the following **minimum** requirements:

- 512 MB RAM
- 100 MB free storage

MySQL



Tiki requires a MySQL 5 database.

The database can be installed in the same physical location of the webserver (that is, as **localhost**) or Tiki can access a remote database.

For all versions, <u>MySQLi extension</u> is recommended but the Tiki installer will fall back to the older MySQL driver if MySQLi is unavailable.

Note on PHP Memory Limits: Some web hosts install PHP with a default **memory_limit = 8m**. Although Tiki may appear to install successfully, you will continually face issues with pages failing to load and system errors. Tiki requires a minimum of **32M**.

To review your PHP Memory Limits, access http://www.yourdomain.com/tiki-phpinfo.php and review the following values:

- max_execution_time = 60; Maximum execution time of each script, in seconds
- max input time = 60; Maximum amount of time each script may spend parsing request data
- memory limit = 32M; Maximum amount of memory a script may consume

For some shared webhosts, these values may not be user-configurable and you may need to request changes from your webhost.

Required PHP Functions

Some webhosts tend to disable some functions which are required for Tiki to run flawlessly.

Function Notes

Required by Smarty templating engine.

eval() Causes "Please contact support about" messages appearing instead of <u>Modules</u> when *eval()* is disabled in php.ini.

php.ini Configuration

We recommend using the following configuration in your **php.ini** file:

memory_limit = 32M	Specify the maximum memory for PHP scripts.	
_file_uploads = On	Required to allow uploads (files, images, etc.) to your Tiki	
upload_max_filesize = XXM	Specify the maxium upload filesize (in MB).	
allow_url_fopen = On	Allow trackback pings in your Tiki blogs.	
session.save_handler = files session.save_path = /tmp	The path that PHP stores session information. Ensure that the location exists and is writable. In Shared Hosting? environments, if you do not have access to /tmp, use temp (no slash) instead.	
max_execution_time = 60 max_input_time = 60	Specify the idle timeout (in seconds). If you experience timeouts (such as when performing Admin functions) you may need to increase these settings.	
magic_quotes_gpc = Off	Turn off PHP's <u>Magic Quotes</u> function.

mbstring.func_overlo ad = 0	Tiki will not work properly with mbstring.func_overload = 7 .	

The location of the **php.ini** file may vary, depending on your operating sytem. Some common locations include:

- /etc/php.ini
- /etc/php/php.ini
- /etc/php4/php.ini
- /etc/php/apache1-php4/php.ini (Gentoo)
- /etc/php/cli-php4/php.ini (Gentoo)
- /etc/php4/apache2 (Debian)

• \windows\system\php.ini (Windows)

Notes:

- 1. If safemode is on you may need safe mode allowed env vars = TZ in php.ini.
- 2. To run PHP5 on 1and1.com add the following lines to your _htaccess file (Tiki 3): AddType x-mapp-php5 .php AddHandler x-mapp-php5 .php uncomment line 29 and 30 then rename in .htaccess

Optional Software or Libraries

Some Tiki feautures require the following additional software or libraries:

Image processing, used for thumbnail generation, dynamic chart generation, and to prevent bot/automatic registration.

Manage and display maps as a GeoCMS (Geospatial Content Management System).

Rewrite Tiki's default URLs

Use either **GD Library** 1.5 (or higher) or **ImageMagick**. ImageMagick is included, by default with PHP 4.3+

Mapserver 4.6+

Use the Apache <u>Clean URLs</u> to create shorter, or custom, URLs.



Step by step installation

Before You Begin

Before installing Tiki, read the <u>Requirements and Setup information</u>. Proper planning can ensure a worry-free installation. If you need a webhost for your Tiki, refer to the list of Tiki Friendly Hosts.

These instructions are intentionally generic, and should apply to most shared host installations. See <u>Installation Guides</u> for instructions for specific combination of operating system and web servers.

Pre-requisites

This guide assumes you have:

- FTP or SSH (shell) access to a webserver (such as Apache) with PHP5
 - Typically, you upload the files via a FTP client such as WinSCP or FileZilla.
- access to a MySQL database (should be provided by your webhost)

1. Create the database

Tiki requires a MySQL databse.

Many hosts offer a point & click interface to create databases and database users. For example, if your web host has <u>cPanel</u> you probably can see <u>phpMyAdmin</u> in the main menu or a the section labeled **Databases**.

Creating a database (and a database user) is a very simple operation. Essentially you will create a blank (empty) database that the Tiki installer will later populate with the correct tables and data.



The Three steps of Database Setup.

- 1. Create a database.
 - You can name the database anything you want, but don't get fancy with the name you can use **tiki**. Depending on your web host, your full database in phpMyAdmin may be listed as *accountname tiki*.

Note: By default, Tiki uses **UTF-8** for your database encoding. We strongly encourage you to select "utf8" in the "**collation**" drop-down box in phpmyadmin (or similar), in the field shown in the following image:



If you select a different encoding method, you may need to manually update your **../db/local.php** file.

Tip: If you plan on having multiple Tiki installations, don't use **tiki** as the database name.

- Be sure to record the database name, you will need it later.
- 2. Create a database **user** (with password).
 - Again, don't get fancy with the database username. In fact, you can use the same name that you selected for the database (in step 1).
 - Select a **strong** password. You can easily recover your database username and password if necessary (by reviewing the .../db/local.php file in your Tiki directory.
 - Be sure to record the username and password. You will need it later.
- 3. Assign all database permissions to the database user that you created (in step 2).

Congratulations. You now have a database that is ready to use, as well a a database user (and password) with the necessary permissions.

2. Download and unzip

<u>Download</u> the current version of Tiki to your local computer from http://tiki.org/download.

The full Tiki archive file download is +20MB and is available in a variety of formats.

After downloading the Tiki archive file, decompress (unzip) the file to your local PC.

3. Upload to your webhost

Use FTP (or SCP, SFTP, Rsync, SSH, etc) to connect to your webhost.

Once connected, find your web directory. It is often called www or public html.

Note: This directory name may vary, depending on your webhost.

Upload all the Tiki files from your PC to you webhost.

- If you upload the Tiki files to the root of your web directory, Tiki will be accessible directly from the URL: http://www.yourdomain.com
- If you have installed (or plan to install) other applications on your webhost, you may consider putting Tiki in its own subdirectory (for example: http://www.yourdomain.com/tiki/).


4. Go to your website.

Open your web browser and access the web directory in which you copied the Tiki files (for example: http://www.yourdomain.com/tiki/ or simply http://www.yourdomain.com if you copied Tiki to the root of your web directory.





You should see a message indicating that Tiki could not connect to the database and prompting you to



run the Tiki installer (tiki-install.php).



This message is normal and indicates that you are ready to install Tiki.

Troubleshooting

If your browser returns an error such as **Parse error: syntax error, unexpected T_STRING**, you may have the incorrect PHP version.

Starting with **Tiki 3.0**, Tiki requires **PHP5**. Review the **_htaccess** file included in the Tiki archive file for instructions on activating PHP5.

File and Folder permissions

If your server is unhappy with Tiki file and folder permissions (this is dependent on server configuration), you may get an error message or blank pages. These failed attempts are typically in the error log (ask your web host to know where they are as it's different depending of your setup)

Too few permissions

If a message appears indicating that specific directories are not writable, you will need to change the permissions on the indicated directories. Tiki will attempt to verify that it can read (and write) to all necessary directories. This error message will include instructions about how to resolve the issue.

Too many permissions

If you are getting Internal Server Error 500, blank pages or similar, it could be that the permissions on the files are not appropriate for your webhost.

If your permissions are currently at "777", use your FTP client to change the files to "755". If Tiki is installed in a directory, make sure to also change the permission of the folder which contains the tiki files.

If you have shell access, you can run:

```
sh setup.sh
```

and answer any questions. If you don't know what to answer, just click "enter" to keep the defaults.

If "sh setup.sh" doesn't work for you, you may try, in your ./tiki/ directory

```
chmod -R
777 .
/db .
/dump .
/img/wiki .
/img/wiki_up .
/img/trackers .
/modules/cache ./temp/cache ./templates c ./templates ./styles ./whelp/
```

Another way is to set permissions for all directories and then set permissions for all files. For example, to set the permissions for all directories to 777 and the permissions for all files to 644, use the following separate commands through shell access:

```
find [YOURDIR] -type d -exec chmod 777 {} \;
```



```
find [YOURDIR] -type f -exec chmod 644 {} \;
```

After correcting any directory or file permission problems, visit tiki-install.php to continue.



1. Run the Tiki installer (tiki-install.php)

Open a web browser to: http://www.yourdomain.com/tiki-install.php (or http://www.yourdomain.com/tiki/tiki-install.php if you installed Tiki in a subdirectory).

The first page of the Tiki Installer appears. This installer will allow you to:

- Pick a language
- Test your server settings
 - If the installer detects that some of your server settings are inadequate, it will suggest changes to comply to the requirements.
- Enter your database name, username, and password. This is the information from the database that you created earlier. You *did* remember to write it down, right?
- Create/update the database
- Set some preferences, such as admin email
- Disable the install script
- · and more

Complete each page of the Tiki Installer.

Alternative "Step 5" without tiki-install.php

If you are unable to complete the Tiki Installer, continue with a Manual Installation.

2. Log in for the first time

Log in using the login box in the right-hand column.

- 1. Enter those informations:
 - 1 **user:** Enter *admin*
 - 2. pass: Enter admin
- 2. Click login.



3. Change the default password.

Use a strong password. You may want to logout right away, and login again, letting your password manager record your password.

4. Congratulations!

It is recommended to create a new user and give him admin privileges instead of regularly using the admin account. You can now explore the interface but you should check the extra steps before to get you started.

5. Configure Your Tiki

Please visit <u>Initial Configuration</u> to explain the recommended next steps, or <u>configuration</u> for the table of contents related to configuring Tiki.

Add new features through post-install Profiles

Starting in <u>Tiki3</u>, you can enable several settings/permissions/content in sets altogether in a single go, in order to provide a common feature to your tiki site (make it multilingual, add freetags, configure it as a Collaborative environment, ...). And all that with a just few clicks through the <u>Profile Manager</u> from "**Admin > Profiles**".

To install Tiki, you basically point your browser to tiki-install.php and follow the instructions. For the vast majority of setups, this works nicely. But what if it doesn't work out for you? (special server setup, etc). Don't worry, there is an alternate way to install Tiki. This assumes you use mysql and have access to phpMyAdmin and know how to use it. Essentially, tiki-install.php does two essential things. It creates your database connection file (db/local.php) and populates the database with tables & data needed by Tiki.

1.1. Create your db/local.php file

Make sure there are no spaces or special characters before or after the code. Of course, replace the values with your own.

1.2. Insert tiki.sql

Platform-specific Installation Information

This section contains additional installation information for specific platforms.

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Tiki Installation on Linux

Initial Steps: Download, Unpack, Create Directories

These initial steps presume you're installing Tiki on a Linux machine running the Apache Webserver. Read this once top to bottom before getting started. If you're using a Windows box you can ignore the portion about setting permissions, but you'll have to set up some of Tiki's directories manually.

Before you get started it's a good idea to know

- your database user name and password
- your apache user and group ID

If you're using the rpm that is available you can skip down to browser based install.

These are notes on how to setup and configure Tiki.

Step one:

Unpack and set the necessary permissions unpack to the document root of where you want tiki installed, e.g. /var/www/tiki/

bz2 file Use



```
tar -xvjf tikiwikiv.xxx
```

(g)zip Dateibenutzung

```
tar -xvzf tikiwikiv.xxx
```

Step two:

CHMOD the file setup.sh to 755.

```
chmod 755 setup.sh
```

The script **setup.sh** in this directory assigns necessary permissions for the directories that the webserver writes files to. It also creates the (initially empty) cache directories. Usage: /setup.sh user group rights list of virtual host domains

For example, if apache is running as user \$AUSER and group \$AGROUP, type: You can find your group using the command 'id'.

```
su -c './setup.sh $AUSER'
```

Alternatively, you may wish to set both the user and group: If not root then

```
su -c './setup.sh $USER $AGROUP'
```

This will allow you to delete certain files/directories without becoming root. Or, if you can't become root, but are a member of the group apache runs under (for example: \$AGROUP), you can type:

```
./setup.sh $USER $AGROUP
```

If root then, and are not a member of the apache group, then type:

```
./setup.sh $USER yourgroup 02777
```

Replace yourgroup with your default group.



NOTE: If you do execute this last command, you will not be able to delete certain files created by apache, and will need to ask your system administrator to delete them for you if needed.

To use Tiki's multi-site capability (virtual hosts from a single DocumentRoot) add a list of domains to the command to create all the needed directories. For example

If Root then

root@localhost tiki] # sh ./setup.sh youruser nobody 02775 test1 test2 test3

If not Root then

./setup.sh \$USER \$AGROUP 02777 domain1 domain2 domain3

This will get you to the next screen go to step three below.

Step three: browser based setup

- create a tiki database
 - using PhpMyAdmin (cache) and MySQL
 - or on the command line mysqladmin create dbname the database name is usually called "tiki"
- Point your browser to the web address that corresponds to the file **tiki-install.php?lang=XX** (http://your_host/tiki/tiki-install.php?lang=XX); being XX the two letter language code of your choice (e.g. em for English, available from Tiki version 1.9.7).
- Follow the instructions there: you will need the password and user name for your database
- For the first time to log into Tiki is
 - · user: admin
 - password: admin

Step four: Custom configuration

Next you can configure Tiki to your needs:

- Choose which features you want switched on
 - click on http://localhost/tiki/tiki-admin.php on the left side of your screen
- (Optionally) create groups of users that share permissions
- Assign appropriate permissions

Debian 5, using PHP 5, MySQL 5

Using your favorite Debian package manager, verify that these packages (and their dependencies) are installed:

mysql-server php5-mysql libapache2-mod-php5

Preparing supporting components for Install

There are three major components you need to configure before you actually install Tiki: PHP, MySQL, and Apache.

PHP Setup

There are several settings that need to be edited in the php.ini file. If you have installed the Debian PHP packages, you will find this file in /etc/php5/apache2/php.ini

1. Make a backup of the php.ini file.

```
cp php.ini php.ini.org
```

2. You must edit these configurations. Some need to be changed, others just need to be umcommented. Set them to the values below:

```
max_execution_time = 60    ; Maximum execution time of each script, in seconds
session.save_path = /var/www/tmp
log_errors = error_log
error_log = syslog
```

The following should not be needed:



3. Save the file and restart apache.

pince:/etc/php5/apache2# invoke-rc.d apache2 restart

Forcing reload of web server: Apache2.

pince:/etc/php5/apache2#

MySQL Setup

If you have installed MySQL from Debian packages, it should already be set up, and the 'mysql' database should be created. You'll need to secure the database, create the tiki database, and grant rights to the tiki database user

- 1. Verify that MySQL is running.
- 2. Secure the mysqladmin (root) user. Follow the instructions at www.mysql.com. Do it now. Leaving this user without a password is insecure.
- 3. Follow the instructions in <u>Requirements</u> to create the tiki database. Use a secure name for the database user. Do not use "admin".

Apache setup

- 1. Make the appropriate modifications to the Apache configs to set up tikiwiki as a host or virtual host. Put a simple file (index.html.en) in the DocumentRoot of your host or virtualhost. Test access from localhost and from external machines.
- 2. Find the name of the user that Apache runs as. Debian uses userid "www-data" by default.

Install Tiki

- 1. Download the latest release.
- 2. Move the tiki tarball to the appropriate directory. Debian places it's document root at /var/www/.
- 3. Untar the tiki release file. It should create a subdirectory with the release number. Here's what mine looked like:

```
pince:/var/www# ls -l
total 35236
lrwxrwxrwx 1 root root 24 2005-11-15 07:26 analog ->
/usr/share/analog/images
drwxr-xr-x 3 root root 4096 2005-12-26 17:07 apache2-default
drwxrwxr-x 20 www-data 1015 16384 2005-12-28 00:36 tikiwiki-1.9.2
-rw-r--r- 1 root root 36014080 2005-12-26 19:38 tikiwiki-1.9.2.tar
```

4. I like to create a symbolic link to my tiki directory:

```
pince:/var/www# ln -s /var/www/tiki-1.9.2 tiki
pince:/var/www# ls -l
pince:/var/www# ls -l
total 35236
lrwxrwxrwx 1 root root 24 2005-11-15 07:26 analog ->
/usr/share/analog/images
drwxr-xr-x 3 root root 4096 2005-12-26 17:07 apache2-default
lrwxrwxrwx 1 root root 23 2005-12-27 23:42 tiki -> /var/www/tikiwiki-1.9.2
drwxrwxr-x 20 www-data 1015 16384 2005-12-28 00:36 tikiwiki-1.9.2
-rw-r--r-- 1 root root 36014080 2005-12-26 19:38 tikiwiki-1.9.2.tar
```

5. Run setup.sh to set permissions on the directories. The defaults should do.

```
/var/www/tiki# sh setup.sh
```

6. Go to tiki-install.php. You may enter open an URL similar to

http://localhost/tiki/tiki-install.php

Normal installation

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Why install Tiki on a Windows desktop?

Tiki is typically used on a server. However, there are instances where installing on a server is not ideal or necessary.

- Testing out Tiki before getting a host
- Easier to install & test locally
- Using Tiki on a local Intranet
- If you have a slow or unreliable Internet connection.

Tiki uses a standard database so you will be able to transfer all your data to a another Tiki installation

Is Tiki complicated to install?

Tiki is fairly easy to install thanks to the install script. However, it is not yet a double click experience Windows users are used to. It gets complicated because Tiki relies on three major external applications to run.

- PHP (scripting language)
- Web server (usually Apache)
- Database (usually MySQL)

These three applications are needed to run Tiki. The nice folks at EasyPHP have bundled these three plus phpMyAdmin (to administer your database via a browser). Once these applications installed, a Tiki database must be created and a Tiki MySQL user must be created with appropriate privileges.

Optional extra steps

Activate some features

Click **Admin (click!)** and then the first icon, Choose what you want to use. As always you can click the help icon at the top of the page to get some information on what you can do.

Create a new user and a group

- Click Users from the Admin menu to add users.
- Click **Groups** from the Admin menu to add groups.
- From Admin groups click assign perms to assign the right permissions to your groups.

You probably need to spend some time there so that everyone has access to and only to what it should access.

Raise PHP's memory limit

Although PHP should run Tiki with 8MB of memory only, it's likely that you will need to set it to 16 MB even if it seems to work at most places.



Enable GD

GD is an graphic library used to perform manipulations on images. Image galleries need such a library. Since GD is bundled with EasyPHP, all you need to do to get image galleries working is to uncomment the line in php.ini that includes GD's DLL and restart Apache.

Install GraphViz and/or Mapserver

If you want to use WIKIGRAPH plugin, you need to install GraphViz. Maps need Mapserver to work.

Install Tiki on XAMPP

This can apply to a windows install or other hence it is a section of Windows Desktop Install.

TikiWiki relies on three major external applications to run.

- PHP (scripting language)
- Web server (usually Apache)
- Database (usually MySQL)

These three applications are needed to run Tiki. You can install Tiki on XAMPP which also provides phpMyAdmin this is the same idea as Windows Local Install EasyPhp

Once these applications installed, a Tiki database must be created and a Tiki mysql user must be created with appropriate privileges.

These instructions were tested on:

• Windows XP SP3 + XAMPP Lite version 1.7.4 + TikiWiki 3.4 LTS

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Step 1: Download xampp and TikiWiki

For TikiWiki, you can choose between different compression formats, you most probably want the .zip, or the .7z if you have 7-Zip installed.

Note, you will need to use:

- the database userid / password that you created in <u>Step 4</u>.
- the database name you entered in <u>Step 3</u>.

Step 8: Configure your tiki & GO!!

Follow <u>Installation instructions</u>, begin at login for the first time and subsequent steps.

- Windows XP machine with EasyPHP 1.7 and TikiWiki 1.8

 - If your browser offers to "remember values" say no.
- 4. Choose the profile that will determine initial settings. *BasicEnabled* is recommended for quick testing but you may want *Default* instead. Detailed descriptions can be read using the link.

 - You should see Your database has been configured and Tiki is ready to run, if this is your first install your admin password is 'admin'.
- 6. Click Login as the administrator and lock installer (Recommended) (Note: in previous versions of Tiki, it said: Click here to remove the install script and proceed into tiki).

- 2. Click login.

It is recommended to create a new user and give him/her admin privileges instead of regularly using the

admin account. You can now explore the interface but you should check the extra steps before to get you started.

 - Caused major issues, but only had to set /temp, /templates_c and db/local.php to run

• That function blindly asks to delete a file without knowing whether it exists. This should be fine and most performant (since it saves a filesystem operation) using the PHP @ error-quieting operator, but that operator has no effect on Tiki since it uses custom error handling. This could be considered a PHP/Smarty bug highlighted by Tiki. We have a similar problem with php-openid. Chealer 20100709

TikiWiki 5.0 Beta1 Install

I created a new Windows 2008R2 virtual server and using the basics listed above, installed 5.0 Beta 1 successfully.

I decided to use the latest software available, and ran into database errors during the Tiki installation with PHP 5.3.2 nts-Win32-VC9 (x386). This could have resulted in missing a line in the php.ini file,



but I am pretty certain everything was in order. After starting over, I went back to 5.3.1 and had no issues.

I also used the latest version of MySQL (5.1.45 x64) with no problems.

Everything else was standard as per above.

Once I had a successful database creation, the page that came up looked like plain html. No formatting at all. However, I was able to change admin password and get into the site. After checking on #tikiwiki, Caarrie pointed me to Admin/Performance. There I unchecked the "Minify CSS†and all of the formatting was perfect! (Thanks again Caarrie). I am not sure if this is a default setting on installation, but if you run into this problem, it is a simple fix.

I am developing a complete set of instructions for Tiki 1.9 that will be available when 1.9 comes out.

These are the steps I used when I installed a fresh copy of Tiki19 on IIS 5 and IIS 6.

I followed the instructions on the IISInstall? page when I first started using Tiki back at version 1.6, so be sure that you follow them if this is your first time setting up Tiki on your system. I've included a portion of the code samples from the IISInstall page below.

Clean URLs

Tiki supports search-engine friendly web addresses (SEFURLs or clean URLs), which are short versions of Tiki URLs, thanks to Apache Rewrite Rules. Some search engine crawlers do not process links with trailing parameters, so transforming the syntax makes the URL more search-engine friendly. By configuring your server properly, Tiki can **understand** clean URLs so that such short URLs will bring up a Tiki page, and by configuring Tiki properly, Tiki will **produce** clean URLS and build them into menus, static links, etc. This page explains both steps: how to make Tiki understand and produce clean URLs.

Note that both the short and long URLs will still access your site.

How to Activate Clean URLs

There are two basic steps to activivating Clean URLs:

- 1. Activating input rewrite rules on your server (so Tiki can *understand* clean URLs)
 - With this step alone, accessing your site with clean URL short links will work properly
- 2. Enabling the SEFURL or SEFURL Filter (version 3.0) feature (or both) in Tiki (So Tiki will *produce* clean URLs)
 - This causes internal Tiki links to be rewritten into clean URLs. The generation of the clean URLs is governed with 'output rewrite rules' that are in the code before Tiki version 3.0 and in the database beginning with 3.0.

Step 1: Activate Input Rewrite Rules on Your Server

Web Hosting Service Using Apache

If you have Tiki version 1.9.x or greater and are using a web hosting service that uses Apache, then input rewrite rules can be activated as follows:

- Rename the file named _htaccess in your Tiki root directory to .htaccess (or create a symbolic link to .htaccess).
 - This will automatically bring in suggested rewrite rules shown below (at <u>Suggested Input Rewrite Rules</u>) into the .htaccess file. The _htaccess file is included as part of the Tiki download (since version 1.9.3) but is not activated by default because it may not work with all server configurations.

Apache Configuration When Managing Own Server

If you manage your server and are using Apache, be sure to

- 1. Load the rewrite module. Something like this line in httpd.conf: LoadModule rewrite_module modules/mod_rewrite.so (adjust the path if necessary). You can check it is ok if you see the mod_rewrite in the apache loaded modules.
- 2. Enable the access to .htaccess. To do so you must have lines like





</Directory>

Adapt the directory path to your need. This block can be in httpd.conf or in your virtual host config (vhosts.d directory in apache2).

Web Servers Other Than Apache

If you or your web hosting company is using a web server other than Apache (IIS for example), see your server manual or contact your web hosting service to find out how to activate rewrite rules on your server.

Rewrite Rules for MultiTiki using Subdirectories as Symlinks



Imagine you have your Tiki set up on a <u>MultiTiki</u>-like installation, and that your Tiki (and the other ones) are created as symlinks. Something like:

- 1. "http://yoursite.com/subdir1/"
- 2. "http://yoursite.com/subdir2/"

Step 2: Configure Tiki to Produce Clean URLs

Now that your input rewrite rules have been set, you now need to configure Tiki to activate the **output** rewrite rules so that Tiki will generate SEFURLs internally in menus, static links and elsewhere.

Starting with version 3.0, there is a search engine friendly feature icon directly on the <u>Admin Home</u> page that will look something like this:



Clicking on that icon will bring up the search-engine friendly url admin page (although you could reach this page through the paths described above for previous versions as well):

Search engine friendly url

Selecting the first checkbox will activate the SEFURL feature within Tiki, meaning that some links used in and elsewhere in Tiki will be search-engine friendly. This doesn't work for all links because not all of the templates have been updated, that's why there is a second checkbox...

Search engine friendly url Postfilter

To generate SEFURLs for all Tiki links, also check the second checkbox which creates short URLs by filtering the output. The SEFURL Postfilter consumes more processor (CPU) time than the non-filter version (it deals with all the text and it deals also with cached text like modules while the 'on the fly' filter does not do it. In future versions the SEFURL Postfilter will not be used - it is only necessary until the template SEFURL work is finished. Either one or both features (SEFURL and SEFURL Postfilter) may be used.

List of Url Parameters that should go in the path

This is used if you want a post or get variable to be represented in the sefurl. For instance if you have a url like **tw.org/tiki-index.php?page=xxx&lang=en** and if you put lang in the setting, the sefurl will be **tw.org/en/xxx**. You can generalize to any number of parameters. For a setting lang,locale, an url



tw.org/tiki-index.php?page=xxx&lang=en&locale=us, the sefurl will be **tw.org/en/us/xxx**. This setting requires you adapt your .htaccess.

Display article title in the sefurl


Clicking this checkbox will add the title of the article to the url for a link to that article. For instance, **tiki-read_article.php?articleId=1** will be transformed into **article1-My-article-title**. This does not work with the postfilter, only with 'on the fly filter'.

Display blog title in the sefurl

Similar to the article checkbox, clicking this checkbox will add the title of the blog to the url for a link to that blog. This does not work with the postfilter, only with 'on the fly filter'.

Within Tiki,

- 1. Go to Admin Home -> Features -> Experimental -> Search engine friendly url (checkbox) + Or use the following URL to get to the Features page (since version 2.0): your URL/tiki-admin.php?page=features
- 2. Check the box for "Search engine friendly url" to select this feature
- 3. Click "Apply" to activate the feature Here's a screenshot:



Changing Rewrite Rules

You can customize the rewrite rules but it is important to note that **that the input and output rewrite rules are connected**, so that if you change one you may need to change the other.

• You can add as many input rewrite rules you want. For instance if you want to be able to access a forum with forum1 or forum 1, no problem. Add the adequate rule in the htaccess that will

- rewrite forum 1 to tiki-view forum.php?forumId=1
- But if you want to change the output "rewrite" rules in Tiki, you must adapt the input rewrite rules
- Starting with Tiki version 3.0, the output rewrite rules are in the table tiki sefurl regex out

WARNING: For sites hosted with MediaTemple's (gs) Grid-Service

After making these changes, your site may mysteriously revert back to using PHP4. This will result in an error such as the following when you try to access your site:

```
Parse error: syntax error, unexpected T_STRING, expecting '{' in
/nfs/c03/h01/mnt/GRID#/domains/YOURSITENAME.COM/html/tiki-install.php on line 45
```

Resolve this by logging into the MediaTemple control panel and switching the site back to PHP5. Afterwards, double-check that your **Search Engine Friendly url** is still enabled in TikiWki.

Developer's Corner

The 'on the fly' filter can use 2 smarty tools: prefilter and a function. Here's an example:

Or how to set up Multiple Tikis on the same server with a single Tiki file set installation. For managing different tiki installations (several copies of the same installation files) in the same or different servers, see TRIM instead.

It is possible to have multiple Tikis on a single server and using a single copy of the installation file set. This can be done through:

- 1. **Multitiki using domains**: using different domain names (i.e. http://site2.org/, ...). or
- 2. **Multitiki using subdirectories**: having your several tikis in subdirectories of the same domain (i.e. http://yourhost/site1/, http://yourhost/site1/, http://yourhost/site2/, ...).

There are some differences depending on the previous option, but there are three major requirements that must be satisfied in both cases:

- Tiki must have an access to a separate database for each URL.
- Apache must know how to associate multiple URLs with the Tiki.
- You must create the necessary directories with the Tiki's main directory.

1. Create a separate database for each url.

• Each database will have a different name. In mysql, creating the databases is normally accomplished with the mysqladmin command. You may have permission to create the database, or you may have to ask a system administrator. To actually tell Tiki which database goes with which URL you have to edit one of Tiki's PHP files. The file db/local.php is designed for this purpose.



See an example of edited local.php file for multikis (either 'multitiki using domains' or 'multitiki using subdirectories') at <u>Manual Installation</u>.

2. Configure the server to host multiple Tikis

2.1. Multitiki using domains

Typically, each Tiki will be accessed by a separate URL through Apache. Generally, the URLs are specified as virtual hosts — often in VirtualHost stanzas within Apache's configuration file. Remember to restart Apache after you have changed the configuration files. On Linux this is usually best done with the "apachectl" graceful command.

On shared hosting, you can use "parked a domain" to have extra domains pointing to the same TikiWiki installation.

2.2. Multitiki using subdirectories

Add symlinks. See the instructions in <u>Manual installation</u> AND in <u>MultiTiki Manual Installation</u> for the time being (and/or improve this page).

3. Create the necessary directories within Tiki's main directory.

• On a Unix system, the easiest way to create the new directories and set permissions is by specifing more than one tikidomain when you run setup.sh. You would run setup.sh with a command like:

3.x 2.x and 1.9.x

Run **setup.sh** from the console, and follow instructions. You'll need to grant execution permission on that file the first time, as user with root privileges:

```
% chmod +x ./setup.sh
```

Then, just run it with no parameters in the command line, and it will start in interactive mode:

```
% ./setup.sh
```

From there follow instructions. Some of the options are explained below:

• Group: Defaults to nobody or www-data or others (depending on the system, whatever the

script will suggesst you as default) but may also be the standard group for the files as uploaded.

• **Multi**: You should add here the names of your multitiki sites, separated by spaces (i.e. "site1 site2", or "www.site1.org www.site2.org", without the quotation marks. The script will create as many subdirectories as appropriate using this name for each tiki site under this multitiki installation.

If it doesn't work for any reason, you can do its job by hand. See <u>Manual Installation</u> if needed.

There are a few minor problems that crop up with this approach. The admins for the various tikis have the ability to overwrite each others changes to the css. Ordinary. users with the same login names on different tikis would also be able to overwrite each other's changes to css files. Finally, you must use Apache's mod rewrite if you want the different Tikis to have their own favicons.

4. Optionally, add .htaccess with rewrite rules

You optionally add some Clean URLs for your tikis.

Note that this page is intended for installations where you have access to a shell in the server to run commands. Alternatively, you might want to follow the steps of the <u>Installation</u> instructions if you only



have ftp access to your host.

You can do this "manually", even for MultiTiki installations.

Note: For Tiki5.1 and onwards (5.3, 6.0, ...), you need to enforce the charset of the connection to utf-8 (unless you know very well what you are doing). Therefore, you need to add in your custom local.php files this new line:

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1. MultiTikis using SubDomains

This section describes a sub-domain MultiTiki setup, where a subdomain points to a directory immediately below your www directory, e.g.:



- site1.mydomain.org (resolves to www.mydomain.org/site1)
- site2.mydomain.org (resolves to www.mydomain.org/site2)

1.1. Create subdirectories

If you can't use setup.sh (<u>See MultiTiki</u>) and/or tiki-install.php, you have to create your subfolders manually for your multitiki installation to work, but you'll need to make symlinks (or have them made for you by an admin), as many as sites you want to install with the same multitiki setup.

You could run ./setup.sh and provide the two names (site1 and site2 afterwards, when requested after the [multi]: option), or you need to manually create your subdirectories site1 and site2 inside each of the following folders:

1.2. Add a single customized local.php for all

You need to add a manually modified ./db/local.php with the following syntax:

1.3. Add local.php for each site

Proceed as usual with tiki-install.php, or if you can't for whatever reason, then, add a standard local.php file inside each of each multitiki subfolders of db, i.e.:

1.4. Create symlinks for the multitiki to work

You need to create symbolic links (symlinks) in order to make your multitiki in subdirectories work.

Example 1

Imagine your www root is at:

/var/www

and you want to setup your multitiki out of the apache public directory, but here instead, for example: /var/tiki

Then you need to create symlinks (or request them to be created by an admin for you), with instructions like these (prepending "sudo" to the commands or switching to the root account):

```
ln -s /var/tiki /var/www/site1
ln -s /var/tiki /var/www/site2
```

1.5. Running tiki-install

You are done with the manual setup. One by one, browse to each of your MultiTiki sites (e.g. http://localhost/site1/ and http://localhost/site1/ and http://localhost/site1/ and http://localhost/site2/) and start configuring them individually.

If you setup a common username and password for all your multi-tiki's, then the tiki-install.php script (Tiki 3.0) will recognize the MultiTiki installation as you proceed.





If you manually coded the db/local.php files and the /db/siteX/local.php files correctly, the tiki-install script sees all the databases as connected. On the left hand side of the image below, all but one database is showing connectivity. If you are happy, you can just use the existing connection to proceed.



NOTE (by little_papillon): in my installation (multi-tiki with multiple domains), I had to update information in /db/virtuals.inc before tiki-install.php would list the multitiki-sites

2. MultiTikis in subdirectories (Directory Structure Setup)

Suppose you want to avoid subdomains or would instead like your tiki structure to be directly accessed and located within a single directory (e.g. under a /var/tiki/, out of the public htdocs folder of your server, for instance, and symlinked from /var/www/site1 and /var/www/site2)

- http://www.mydomain.com/tiki1
- http://www.mydomain.com/tiki2

The setup is similar to a subdomain MultiTiki setup (see above). By way of example, we will be setting up **site1 and site2** with the URLs shown at the top of this section. This example assumes a directory /**var/www/** where your sub-tiki's will be "located". For sake, if someone does enter www.mydomain.com/ we have setup to redirect them to the main (site1).

We begin by loading all the tiki files into the /var/tiki/ directory.

2.1. Create Subdirectories

Per instructions *above*, either run setup.sh or manually create the required subdirectories for your various tikis (tiki1, tiki2)



2.2. Add a single customized local.php for all

This is where we will diverge somewhat slightly from the subdomain strategy. Namely, we need to test the REQUEST_URI to determine where to funnel the visitor.

Once again, with our specific example values shown, you need to add a manually modified ./db/local.php with the following syntax:

db/local.php

Note how if all else fails, we'll send the user directly to our tiki of choice (site1).

2.3. Add local.php for each sub-tiki

Again, we'll branch a little from the prior setup by populating out the local php files for each tiki.

At this point, it helps to take a side step and set up your databases (see documentation elsewhere). For simplicity you may want your MultiTikis to share a common username/password, but this is not necessary (or particularly secure).

Below is an example for our **site1**. This file would get saved under ./db/site1/local.php



./db/site1/local.php

2.4. Create Symlinks

You need to create symlinks (or request them to be created by an admin for you), with instructions like these:

This will effectively redirect a visitor headed to www.mydomain.com/site2 to www.mydomain.com/site2 where our local.php script will parse the REQUESTED_URL, realize that the user wants site2 and proceed accordingly. If the visitor attempts to visit www.mydomain.com/site3, he/she will be redirected to www.mydomain.com/site1 instead.

2.5. Run tiki-install.php

Now, for each site, you will browse to it and run tiki-install.php (e.g. <u>www.mydomain.com/site1/tiki-install.php</u>)

A few notes:

- Since we went ahead and setup our ./db/site1/local.php files, you will see that the installer recognizes the MultiTiki's during the setup.
 - "Not sure if this is required, but during installation it seemed to be important to click on the MultiTiki (selecting it and turning it **bold**) that you are installing.
 - Given the above, since the database is setup, you can use the Existing Connection you selected.
- If you are setting up multiple tiki's, use the Enter Without Locking The Installer until you get to the last tiki....to keep from having to constantly delete the ./db/lock file.



3. Extra: Add .htaccess for all (optional)

You can also add a single customized .htaccess for them all at the MultiTiki root See Rewrite rules | Clean URLs

How to Install Multiple TikiWikis Using Subdomains on Windows XP

This page describes how to install multiple TikiWiki applications under one Apache web (HTTP) server using the "MultiTikiâ€⊒subdomain approach.

TikiWiki-3.1 Apache HTTP Server 2.2 MySQL RDBMS 5.3.1

Apache, PHP, and MySQL were installed as part of installing XAMPP, so the locations of their respective directories may differ from what is on your machine.

The resulting installation will have one TikiWiki code-base (php, smary, javascript, etc.) and three distinct MySQL databases (housed under one MySQL relational database management system). TikiWiki's installer program will create additional directories for each sub-domain, that would not ordinarily be seen after installing a single TikiWiki application.

1.	Create a directory	in a	location	outside	of A	lpache's i	root d	directory.

In XAMPP, Apache serves up files out of the "htdocsâ€□directory <u>for example: C:\xampp\htdocs</u>. On your machine Apache may serve files out of "wwwâ€□or "public htmlâ€□

If you are not sure of what your root directory is, locate the httpd.conf file under the apache installation, and search for the following sectionâ€



In this document, I created a directory called subdomains (name it what you like) as followsâ€!

"C:\subdomainsâ€□

2. Unzip (or decompress) the TikiWiki-3.1.zip file.

In this example, I rename TikiWiki-3.1 to "taf" - the name of my application - so I end up with "C:\subdomains\tafâ€□

You will serve-up TikiWiki out of this directory <u>"C:\subdomainsâ€□</u>, rather than Apache's root directory.

3. Locate and create a backup of Apache's â€æhttpd.confâ€□file.

In an XAMPP install, it can be found here:

C\xampp\apache\conf\httpd.conf

4. Modify the "httpd.confâ€□file not the backup as described belowâ€₁



5. Locate the "hostsâ€□file on your Windows XP machine and add your subdomains.



6. Locate the "httpd-vhosts.conf†file, in the "extra†subdirectory at the following location.

8. Restart your Apache web server, after you have saved the changes to httpd.conf, hosts, and (possibly) httpd-vhosts.conf.

12. Start the installer for your first domain, by entering "http://<first_subdomain>.localhost/tiki-install.php" in the address bar.

Here I type in http://demo.localhost/tiki-install.php. In my example, "demoâ€□was the name of one of my subdomains. The following screen should be displayed upon entering the installer address...



This is important!

If things have gone well, you should see references to "MultiTikiâ€□displayed in the box on the left-hand side of the browser.

Since I typed in the subdomain for demo, the "demo.localhost†is bolded where it says "DB OK†This indicates that the install is targeted for the database defined for the "demo†subdomain. The installer will create several subdirectories for each subdomain, within your original TikiWiki installation directory or "taf†in my case. Run through these same install steps for each of your subdomains. Make sure that the given subdomain is "bolded†when doing the install for it.



Do NOT lock the installer until after you have run it for your LAST subdomain.

On the last screen of the installer, you will be given the chance to enter your tikiwiki site with or without locking the installer. Choose NOT to lock the installer, until your have installed the tiki for your last subdomain.

If you mistakenly choose to lock the installer, merely delete the "lock" file found under the "db" directory of your MultiTiki code-base, and continue installing tiki for your remaining subdomains.

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What

- A combination of shell and PHP scripts to install, update, backup, restore and monitor (check security of) a large number of Tiki installations (instances).
- TRIM facilitates/automates the operations you would normally do by logging into each server.
- A great tool if you want to setup a WikiFarm
- It is **not** a script to update your Linux or MySQL installation (but it may one day do some server checks to see if your Apache, PHP, MySQL, GD, etc. versions are OK).
- Originally developed for Tiki, it was designed so it could be ported/used for just about any



php/mysql application which has CVS or SVN as a source. If you want to port to a different app, let's work together!

How it works

TRIM is installed on a **master** server. TRIM then connects by SSH (and more recently via FTP) to various servers and, via a wizard (you answer the questions interactively), permits you to manage various **instances** of Tiki. You can install, upgrade, backup, check the file integrity and do various other things. Some actions can be run unattended on a cron job.

Limitations

- Although CVS can work, it is not supported and bugs will not be fixed. The Tiki community has been using SVN for a long time now.
- FTP support has been added, however, you can run into memory limitations (outside of TRIM's control)

Alternatives

If you have a large number of Tiki installations, you could use <u>MultiTiki</u> where all files (php/tpl/etc) are shared amongst several domains (but you can have .css and .tpl which override for your domain) but each domain has a distinct DB. TRIM is different where each domain is totally independent. Distinct database **and** distinct files **and** can be on different hosts.

Advantages of TRIM over MultiTiki

- 1. With TRIM, each instance can be on totally different servers or on various directories on the same server, so you can easily scale to as few or as many servers as you want.
- 2. Once an instance is in a MultiTiki, it's a little tricky to extract it. For example, it's easier to provide a backup of just one instance, using TRIM.
- 3. If you have multiple domains and need to provide distinct access for each (emails, ftp accounts, access to logs, etc.), it can be easier to have distinct server space.
- 4. With MultiTiki, if you have a security issue, all your Tikis are potentially compromised because they share the same files. (even for the Tikis that have not enabled the unsafe feature)
- 5. With TRIM, you can pick & choose which Tikis to upgrade. With MultiTiki, all the instances get the upgrade. Even if they don't need the bug fixes or enhancements, they are still at risk of being affected by a <u>regression</u>. So all instances need to be checked after each upgrade.
 - This takes a lot of time. And then, you can introduce issues for projects that were quite happy with the previous version. They didn't need new stuff, but inherited some problems.

- 6. With TRIM, you can modify the templates/*.tpl files and still use the merging features of cvs/svn to take advantage of the enhancements to the main code base (There could be conflicts to manually resolve during upgrades though). Using multiTiki, you must put all changes in a separate directory and can't easily benefit from improvements to the main code base.
- 7. TRIM handles offsite backups

Advantages of MultiTiki over TRIM

- 1. Uses less disk space
- 2. Can upgrade hundreds of Tikis in one operation
- 3. MultiTiki has been developed and refined for years and is used in production, whereas TRIM is relatively new and still in development
- 4. TRIM requires SSH access TRIM can now work via FTP, whereas maybe MultiTiki can be run just with FTP. Depending on your server, you may have a lot of permissions to change by FTP though.
- 5. TRIM requires more things on the server (sqlite, svn, etc) not anymore, you can use FTP mode and heavy work is done on TRIM master, and result is pushed to the TRIM instance.
- 6. MultiTiki has a web-based interface

What if I want to share data between instances?

Sharing data between Tiki instance is not specific to TRIM. If you want to share logins, groups and preferences throughout many Tiki sites, you can use <u>InterTiki</u>.

Documentation

Here is a brief explanation of the basic commands that can be used. All commands follow a wizard pattern.

make instance

Adds an instance to be managed by TRIM. Trim attempts to perform various operations from this point:

- 1. Share an RSA key to connect to the remote host in the future
- 2. Make a few verifications on remote host
- 3. Detect the application installed remotely and the version
- 4. If nothing is installed, propose to install something



You will be prompted to enter a pass phrase. If you enter one, you will be prompted every time you use TRIM. Unattended backups and security checks will not be possible.

The installation process will ask to create a database and user for Tiki. To do this, root access on the MySQL database (or user with similar privileges) is required. Otherwise, database settings can be entered manually (The database needs to have been created before in cPanel, webmin or similar).

make check

This is somewhat equivalent to a <u>secdb</u> check, except that it's safer because it's made from a trusted host and will take your custom modifications on host into consideration. Upon first run, the check will ask where it should fetch the hashes from

- source : obtain the hashes from the official repository. After setting up the expected hashes, a check will be performed.
- current: use the files currently online as the source of hashes. If this is a recent install, this may be safe. However, if the host was already compromised, hacks will be undetected.
- skip: Move on for now

When files are altered, added or removed, TRIM will prompt with various solutions.

- For modified files, it will allow to view the changes that were made and propose to accept or reject them. Rejecting changes will fetch a copy of the file from the repository.
- For added files, it will be possible view the file and then accept or reject it. Rejecting the file will remove it from the remote host.
- Removed files will allow to accept or reject the removal. Rejection will fetch a copy from the repository.

make update

Allows to update a CVS/SVN instance (cvs up/svn up) and update the file hashes accordingly. It also performs the database update. The hash verification/update may prompt with some files containing conflicts if modifications were made on the instance.

During the update process, the instance is disabled using a .htaccess file (previous one is preserved), making the site unavailable until the update is completed.

To setup automated updates

run:

php scripts/setupupdate.php



Do not pick the same time as automatic backup!

make upgrade

Similar to update. Requests for the branch to switch to over the update. You will have several choices of branches. Please not that you should **NOT** downgrade as Tiki doesn't support a downgrade database script. An upgrade is a one-way street! You should make a backup before you upgrade so you can return to this version if issues arise.

make convert

Converts an instance from CVS BRANCH-1-9 to SVN branches/2.0.

- All script customizations will be lost
- Database, img/wiki and img/wiki up are preserved

make fix

Run setup.sh on the remote host using automated parameters. It should work in most cases. If the command proposed my setup.sh without parameters or super user rights are required, you should connect to the remote host manually using 'make access'.

make access

Opens a shell to the remote host. Because TRIM manages all your connections, using this command simply avoids needing to remember passwords.

make watch

Set-up a cron job on the TRIM master to perform the Hash check (make check) automatically every day. The script will prompt for a contact email address to notify with the log in the case of a suspicious file change (which could be an intrusion or someone who legitimately changed a file on the server) and the time at which the script should run.

make backup

What can go wrong and how should this script protect me?

- My host disappears
- A vandal messes up my files
- User error (oups, I erased some files)



TRIM performs a complete backup of the Tiki instance. The backup includes all files on remote host (including user files and files stored out of the web root) and a dump of the database. Each backup is archived in the TRIM ROOT/backup/archive folder as a .tar.bz2 file. The backup file contains:

- manifest.txt: Indicates where folders were located on the remote host
- database dump.sql : Self-explanatory
- <u>a-f0-9</u>{32}: Folders named using a hash. Content of the folders on remote host. The manifest.txt file lists these hashes.

Archives are cleaned up after each run. The rules are the following:

- Backups made on the first of any month are kept forever.
- Backups made on Sunday are kept for 31 days.
- Daily backups are kept for a week.

On your first backup, you may get a harmless error message

rm: cannot remove `/home/trim/xyz/backup/1/manifest.txt': No such file or directory

To setup automated backups

run.

php scripts/setupbackup.php

Do not pick the same time as automatic update!

make restore

You can restore on a blank install. To make a blank install, just do make instance but cancel when TRIM offers you to install Tiki.

make delete

Delete the instance via the command line (you could also do via the web interface). This does **NOT** delete your Tiki. It just deletes the instance connection to it.

make enablewww

Activate the TRIM Web Administration. The script asks a few questions and changes some permissions.

Rewrite rules are necessary for TRIM Web Administration

Requirements

- PHP 5.x with SQLite extension (on master server) (uses SQLite 2.1 format)
- PHP 4.x should be OK for remote servers.
- PHP Command Line Interface (PHP-CLI) on both master and remote servers
- Shell (SSH) access on master and remote (eventually, it should work on remote servers with only FTP)
- Both master and instances can be shared hosting as long as you have SSH access. It is recommended that the master be installed on a very safe machine because it has SSH access keys to all your instances.

• Rewrite rules (on master server) are necessary for TRIM Web Administration

Shell commands/scripts

- make
- subversion (svn) (1.10, 2.x and 3.x sites use svn)
- cvs (assuming you'll be maintaining some 1.9x sites via CVS)
- php5-cli (This is the command line version of PHP, which is not always installed)
- sqlite (This is the database where TRIM will store data about the various instances)
- php5-sqlite (extension)
- php5 (for webtrim)
- cron (optional, to automate unattended tasks)
- rsync (for backups)
- sendmail (to send you email notifications of changes to your files)
- bzip2 (for backups)

To restore backups on TRIM (for testing)

- ssh
- phpmysql

ext/ssh2

ext/ssh2 is not mandatory, but highly recommended to speed up TRIM. It will also avoid many weird error messages and it is much stabler. Without it, it *should* work but some things may not.

To install it under Debian or Ubuntu:

```
# sudo apt-get install libssh2-php
```

To restore backups on TRIM machines

We want to test that the backups are indeed working so we need a fully functioning php-mysql environment. By installing phpmyadmin, we should get this. We also want SSH because TRIM connects via SSH to restore these backups, the same as it would connect anywhere.

To install necessary software under Debian or Ubuntu: Install what is needed to run php-mysql apps and for TRIM to connect

```
# sudo apt-get install phpmyadmin ssh
```

Install ImageMagick

For those that use the image gallery in tiki, note that GD is used by php for image processing. But GDlib comes with some restrictions on file formats, especially regarding GIF use. Support for Image Magick is added now, that offers a wider range of available file formats.

Install ImageMagick and Libs

Get Image Magick from http://www.imagemagick.org/

- Be sure to install the libraries.
 - On RPM based system (RedHat, Mandrake) rpm -q libMagick5 libMagick5-5.4.8.3-2mdk
 - On APT based system (Debian, Knoppix) apt-get -s install imagick



Install Imagick PECL Module

- Get the PECL module from http://pecl.php.net/package/imagick Or use pecl to download it: pecl install imagick
 - Activate the extension in /etc/php.ini extension=imagick.so
- Windows Users can download a dll from http://php.chregu.tv/php_imagick.dll or http://snaps.php.net/ pecl file. php_imagick.dll has to be placed into the extension_dir directory (/php/extensions...), add

```
extension=php imagick.dll
```

to php.ini, and finally copy all the dll files from ImageMagick installation root directory to /windows/system32.

- Debian sid users have that package : apt-get install php4-imagick
- Other users have to compile it. To compile it, you have to recompile your PHP Get the PHP sources on http://php.net, read the INSTALL file from the imagick module and ./configure PHP with --with-imagick

Special Tip:

If your compilation stops, There are 2 Bugs:

- do a "rm ./configure" in your php src directory before performing Step 8 of the INSTALL-file of imagick.
- edit imagick.c (Version 0.95) Line 624 should be "RunlengthEncodedCompression" not "RLECompression", this may depend on your libMagick however your make should tell you the right way. Install your new PHP, restart your webserver. Do a phpinfo() to see if Imagick support is added. If not, you may have forgot to rm ./configure.

Tikiwiki setting up

In the <u>Image Gallery Config</u> select Imagick as **Library to use for processing images**. If PHP is unable to find the PHP Imagick the setting reverts back to GD.

Graphviz Install

Graphviz provides a collection of tools for manipulating graph structures and generating graph layouts.

For those who would like to use **Dynamic SiteMap?** graph generation in Tikiwiki, we recommend the Graphviz library and the <u>PluginWikigraph</u>. GraphViz with Wikigraph plugin (in mods.tw.o) work well still with Tiki 3 LTS, but not with Tiki 6 LTS.

Install Graphviz and Libs

- On Windows the default installer exe should do all necessary steps. Get Graphviz from http://graphviz.org/pub/graphviz/.
- On RPM based system (RedHat, Mandrake) rpm -q graphviz
- On APT based system (Debian, Knoppix) apt-get -s install graphviz
- For Portage users (Gentoo) emerge graphviz

Troubleshooting Hints

- Graphviz consumes LOTS of memory with even small (no. of wikipages less than 100) wiki content. Try to keep the *Level* of the graph low in order to use wiki pages including dynamic graphs.
- If you use Windows, copy GraphViz binary files (dot.exe, neato.exe, etc) from the GraphViz bin folder to the windows\system32 or equivalent folder (NaV/system32). The installer should have done this job for you, but we recommend double-checking if you encounter errors. It's not the same to put the exe's in the path, they must be in a Windows system directory.
- In PHP Safemode environments, special adjustments need to be made to use external libraries.

Upgrade your Tiki site

Upgrading Tiki is very similar to its <u>installation</u>. Upgrading is a **one-way process**. There is no way to downgrade, other than reverting to a backup. Before undertaking a major upgrade (e.g. from 5.x to 6.x) perform a test upgrade on a backup before proceeding with the real upgrade.

Do I need to upgrade?

Depends. Some versions of Tiki are listed as <u>Long Term Support</u> which means developers are continuing with security patches and bug fixes on that version. If you are upgrading only for security reasons, you can stay with the LTS version you are at. Major upgrades introduce new features, but existing features, themes, plugins and modules may not function as they did before. A test upgrade is strongly recommended. Upgrades within a branch (having the same version number) are unlikely to cause problems and recommended for security reasons.

Overview: How an upgrade works

- 1. Backup all the files and database from your current installation.
- 2. Reinstall the new version, preferrably into a empty folder.
- 3. Copy any custom files (css, uploaded files and images, custom from your backup.
- 4. Run the installer (tiki-install, which upgrades the database

Do I really need to download and then upload the whole thing? - For some upgrades a "patch version" is available, if only a few files have been modified.

Alternatives to FTP: Rather than downloading and re-uploading the whole package, use commands *svn* or *wget* (ask your hosting provider) to move the files directly from SourceForge to your server.

1. Determine the version of your current Tiki

You can check by visiting tiki-admin.php?page=general

<u>If your current Tiki is less than 1.9.0</u>Tiki 1.9.0 was released on 2005-04-27 so it's highly unlikely that you still are running one. Older data upgrades scripts were removed from Tiki but are still available to download.

: You need to upgrade to 1.8 first: <u>Upgrade 1.7 to 1.8</u> and then, <u>Upgrade 1.8.x to 1.9.y</u> (do not upgrade directly from 1.7.x to 1.9.x or later)

From 1.9.0 and more recent to any subsequent version (3.x, 4.x, etc): You can upgrade directly. Tiki 3.x/4.x/5.x/6.x includes all the database migration scripts from 1.9.0 to that version. You may wish to manually re-run the installer script for the version you are on, and watch for unexpected errors.

Deactivate custom themes: custom themes and custom .tpl files from older versions are unlikely to work and may cause an upgrade failure. Deactivate custom themes by on your new install by changing the name of the active css file, so it will not be found by tiki - which causes it to revert to the default theme.

2. Determine to which version you want to upgrade to

Keep in mind that <u>Tiki3</u> and <u>Tiki6</u> are versions kept as Long Term Support (LTS) and that it's always safer to upgrade to the latest release in that branch. Use version 4.1 (i.e. 4.1 instead of 4.0) if you are running production sites with extensive usage of many features.

· Download Tiki



In some cases of new releases (such as 6.3, for instance), you have the option to download and install only the files that have changed (from a compressed file, like: "tikiwiki-inc-6.2-to-6.3.tar.gz"), or to download the full new version (eg. "tikiwiki-6.3.tar.gz").

3. Fresh install or Install over existing?

Fresh install (recommended)

You will need to manually move and/or re-integrate any data that is not stored in the MySQL database, for example images and attachments saved as files. This is the recommended process, specially if you have a custom theme style, or one theme style not supported by the new tiki version you are going to use.

Install over existing (NOT recommended for major updates)

This will not delete any Tiki file which was used in previous versions, but are not longer needed. These files shouldn't do anything except waste a bit of disk space, except for the case of template files (.tpl files under ./templates or subfolders). You can use <u>Security Admin</u> to detect leftover PHP files.

This is not recommended because you are keeping all files from previous tiki versions, which may include old-fashioned tpl files, might conflict with the new version specially in theme styles which have changed or which are not supported any more in the new version of Tiki. That's why the best option to avoid any potential conflict is to install a new tiki on a new directory, and replace the old one with the new one, plus re-insert the custom files that you need (img/wiki_up, modified tpl files once you now that they are updated to the new Tiki version, etc). See below at "Fresh Install".

If it's a minor release (5.1 to 5.2), it's unlikely to cause any issues because templates don't change much and there are just bug fixes.

4. Create a Backup

You need to backup

- 1. Your entire folder where Tiki is installed (and all subfolders)
- 2. Your MySQL database

See: Backup for details

5. Update your files

Tiki files are distributed in a compressed archive (ex.: .zip). You need to unpack (unzip) the files and



upload them to your web server.

Fresh install

Instead of copying over your old files, you can make a fresh install. If you are upgrading to a version previous than Tiki 5.1, you can indicate the database information of your previous Tiki install (info in db/local.php).

Note for Tiki versions after 5.1 (5.3, 6.0, ...):

You are encouraged NOT to manually copy or edit your old local.php into the new site, but let the Tiki installer script (tiki-install.php) create that local.php file when needed in a later step, since it will handle properly the former encoding issue for you.

Things that you may need to copy from your old site to your new site:

- img/wiki up folder content (uploaded wiki images)
- any customized *.tpl files
- any customized styles (*.css)
- any file gallery directories if using the file system to store the files
- any image gallery directory if using the file system to save the images
- Any customized code
 - If you make changes which can be useful to others, please consider joining the Tiki community and sharing your enhancements. Beyond helping others, you no longer will need to re-instate and maintain your enhancements at each upgrade. Please see How to get commit access.

Database Collation

In case you are upgrading but in a new server, and thus, you need to create a new database first, please ensure that you create your new database with **utf8 collation**.

• **Note**: By default, Tiki uses **UTF-8** for your database encoding. We strongly encourage you to select "utf8" in the "**collation**" drop-down box in phpmyadmin (or similar), in the field shown in the following image:



During the upgrade to Tiki 5.1 (or later) through tiki-install.php, Tiki will attempt to do this for you if

needed, but in some rare cases Tiki fails to set the collation to utf8, and therefore, you have to do that manually. If the database is already created with latin1 collation, and you want to change that afterwards, you can change the collation through phpmyadmin in the "**Operations**" tabs once you have selected your database.

Install over existing

To upgrade, copy or upload all the files of the newer version onto the files of the older version so any older ones are replaced (FTP with "overwrite if source is newer").

Before overwriting the files, remove the non-customized style-specific templates (templates/styles/*, and templates/yoursite/* if any). Previous versions often contained per-style modifications. Those files have since been removed from standard distribution, leaving the old files intact and not taking advantage of enhancements.

Updating via SVN

If you install using SVN, you can easily update via SVN -> Get Code

6. Check permissions



File and Folder permissions

If your server is unhappy with Tiki file and folder permissions (this is dependent on server configuration), you may get an error message or blank pages. These failed attempts are typically in the error log (ask your web host to know where they are as it's different depending of your setup)

Too few permissions

If a message appears indicating that specific directories are not writable, you will need to change the permissions on the indicated directories. Tiki will attempt to verify that it can read (and write) to all necessary directories. This error message will include instructions about how to resolve the issue.

Too many permissions

If you are getting Internal Server Error 500, blank pages or similar, it could be that the permissions on the files are not appropriate for your webhost.

If your permissions are currently at "777", use your FTP client to change the files to "755". If Tiki is installed in a directory, make sure to also change the permission of the folder which contains the tiki files.

If you have shell access, you can run:

```
sh setup.sh
```

and answer any questions. If you don't know what to answer, just click "enter" to keep the defaults.

If "sh setup.sh" doesn't work for you, you may try, in your ./tiki/ directory

```
chmod -R
777 .
/db .
/dump .
/img/wiki .
/img/wiki_up .
/img/trackers .
/modules/cache ./temp/cache ./templates_c ./templates ./styles ./whelp/
```

Another way is to set permissions for all directories and then set permissions for all files. For example, to set the permissions for all directories to 777 and the permissions for all files to 644, use the following separate commands through shell access:

```
find [YOURDIR] -type d -exec chmod 777 {} \;
```



```
find [YOURDIR] -type f -exec chmod 644 {} \;
```

After correcting any directory or file permission problems, visit tiki-install.php to continue.

After correcting any directory or file permission problems, visit **tiki-install.php** to continue.

1. tiki-install.php to update your database

(A) Fresh install

On the tiki-install.php page of this *new* site, connect to the same database as your *old* site (you can find this info in the file db/local.php of your *old* site) and follow the instructions to upgrade your site. Make sure to click upgrade and not install, else you wipe out your database.

Note:

For upgrades to versions equal or later than 5.1 (5.3, 6.0, ...), you are encouraged to re-set the connection settings, while keeping the "Force utf-8 connection" option checked, and follow the onscreen instructions.

For upgrades to earlier branches and versions (like any of the Tiki3 LTS branch), you can alternatively just copy db/local.php from your old site to your new site, to avoid entering the information, if you wish.

(B) Install over existing

Then, go to tiki-install.php and click the "upgrade" button, which will update the database. Tiki can read your previous db/local.php file and use this information.

Note:

However, for upgrades to versions equal or newer than 5.1 (5.3, 6.0, ...), you are encouraged to re-set the connection settings, while keeping the "Force utf-8 connection" option checked, and follow the on-screen instructions.

If the installer was previously locked (which it should be), you will need to unlock it by deleting db/lock

Fix the encoding issue

Upgrade from previous to 5.1 to 5.1 or newer



Either (A) or (B): fix the encoding issue (5.0 or before -> 5.1 or later)

Previously to Tiki 5.1, some users might have had a double encoding issue in the database of their Tiki. To ensure that this potential problem is fixed for all, if you are upgrading from a Tiki version equal or earlier than 5.0, into some newer Tiki version (5.1, ...5.x; 6.0, 6.x...), you are encouraged to follow once the three steps to fix the issue by means of the **tiki-install.php** script.

1. Force connection to utf-8 in db/local.php


Briefly explained above. For the sake of clearness, covered here in detail.

- Go to tiki-install.php, and follow steps until step 4: "Set the Database Connection".
- Even if you have a local.php file already there, click on "Modify database connection" instead of "Use Existing Connection". This will open a form in the lower part of the window for you

• At the bottom, there will be a section called "Character set", with a checkbox called "Always force connection to use UTF-8", that needs to be kept as checked.

Fill in your db/local.php details through that form, and click on the "Continue" bottom at the bottom when ready.


• Continue to step 5 in the installation process, where you'll have the opportunity to "Convert database and tables to UTF-8" (see below).

2. Convert database and tables to UTF-8

In step 5 of the installation process, you will be offered the option to "Convert database and tables to UTF-8", and you will be also shown the current encoding of your database.

• Write down the name of the current encoding of your database, because you will need it in the next step below.

- You can now click on the button "Convert database and tables to UTF-8".
- Once successfully performed, you will not see this option anymore, but just the usual question of whether you want to Re-install the database, or "Automatically upgrade your existing database to" your new Tiki version. Choose this later option, since you are upgrading.

(Note: This step is converting you db collation to utf-8, and your db tables to use the utf-8 charset also.)

3. Convert content from your previous encoding to utf-8

Finally, you need to convert the content from your existing database (content from wiki pages, etc., but also preferences, which include paths to file and image attachments, like in image galleries, etc.) to utf-8.

• To do so, you have an option in the final step under the section "Upgrading and running into encoding issues?"

• In the dropdown called "Previous table encoding", choose the one which applies to your case (you wrote it down in the previous step), and click on the button: "Dangerous: Fix double encoding"

Given the nature of this fix, it's best to do some quick <u>verification</u> of the changes.



Congratulations! You are done.

You can now enter Tiki locking the installer (recommended) or without locking it, and continue using Tiki as normally.

If you have any issues, provide feedback through the usual <u>Support</u> channels.

Alternative: Upgrading your database through shell



Upgrading your database manually through shell (faster than phpmyadmin)

Note:

If you upgrade from a version earlier to Tiki 5.1 to a version of Tiki 5.1 or newer, you are encouraged to run at least once the **tiki-install.php** script as explained above, so that you fix the encoding issue that may exist in your database previous to Tiki 5.1.

Assuming you have the command line version of PHP (PHP-CLI), you can simply use the command line version of the installer.

For multi-tiki installations, the dev script can be used. PHP-CLI is still required.

```
sh doc/devtools/sqlupgrade.sh
```

If you are updating your database this way instead of tiki-install.php, you should clear your cache (which tiki-install.php does)



2. Post tiki-install.php

At the end, proceed as usual to the Tiki site while disabling the tiki-install.php script.


3. Update the .htaccess file

Tiki ships with a _htaccess file. It needs to be renamed to .htaccess and replace the one from the previous version. If you made any customizations, you should redo them in the new file. See: <u>Clean URLs</u>

4. Test

What to expect as problems

- Changes of behavior
 - A feature was activated but no longer is (ex. default behavior has changed). You need to go to the admin panel and activate it.
- Bugs
 - Each Tiki version brings loads of new features. However, sometimes, enhancements can



- If you customized your themes, they may come out weird
 - You should plan a bit of time to re-integrate your customizations in the new theme.
- If you've upgraded your MySQL server from 4 to 5, when you login for the first time, you may get an "Account disabled" error. To repair this:

```
mysql -u user_dbuser -p user_dbname -B -e "update users_users set
waiting=NULL where waiting is not NULL and valid is NULL;"
```

4.1. Check your content

Check if your new web site contains everything from the old website.

4.2. Check that the features you used to use are still turned on.

More specifically, structures, search, individual plugins, and some other features may have to be activated in the admin panel.

4.3. Revise potentially unsafe plugin calls and approve or reject them

Usage of potentially unsafe wiki plugins has to be validated by users with the new permissions related to approve plugins. This way, any usre can make any attempt to use potentially any plugin, including iframe, dbreport, tag, sql, snarf, regex... which would need to be validated by some trusted users/editors/admins later on in order to approve or reject them.

A list of plugin calls pending revision can be found at any time here: tiki-plugins.php
