

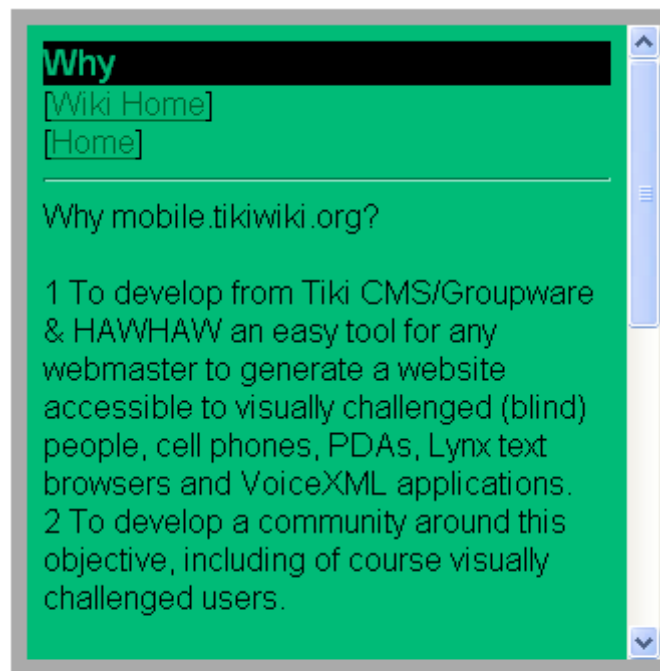
Mobile Tiki User
