

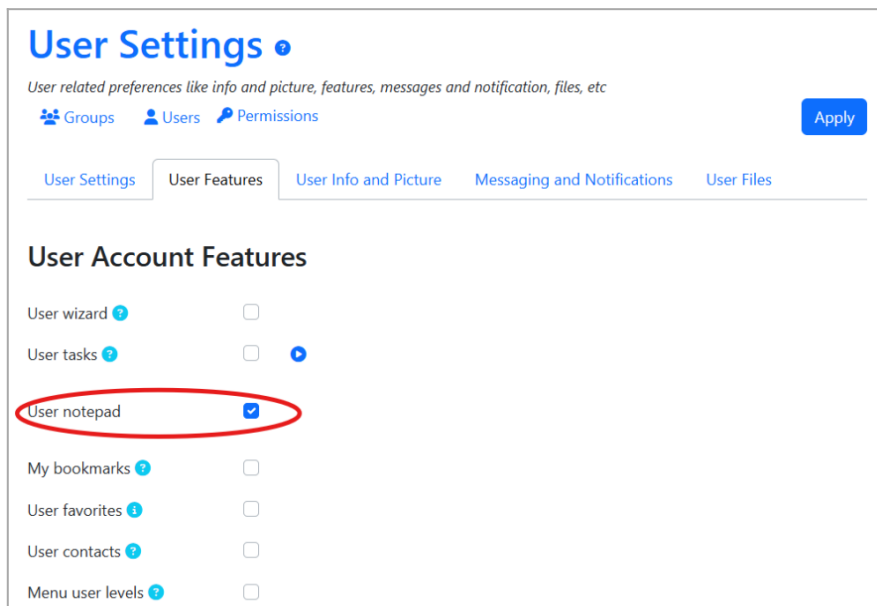
User Notepad



A note can also be uploaded from the local disk using the upload box at the bottom. Note that user notes are always stored in the database. The quota is configured as the same quota used for user files (see user files next).
